### INTRODUCING THE COMMANDING OFFICER

Captain Snackenberg was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., and lived there until he entered the U.S. Naval Academy in 1917. Before graduation from Annapolis in 1921 he took part in cruises with the Atlantic Fleet on the U.S.S. Ohio in 1918 and on the U.S.S. Flor-

ida in 1919.
After graduation, he served aboard the U.S.S. Pennsylvania, then the flagship of the Atlantic Fleet until 1924. From the U.S. S. Pennsylvania he went to the U.S.S. Galveston, CL, as Navigator staying aboard her until June

He left the fleet to take postgraduate work in explosives at the Academy and at the University of Michigan, and, in 1927-29 Captain Snackenberg travelled among various ammunition depots

in the country.
In 1928-29, he rejoined the
U.S.S. Pennsylvania, this time
as Plotting Room Officer.
From 1929-31 Captain Snackenberg was Ass't. Fire Control
Officer aboard the U.S.S. Oklahoma whence he went to the Bureau

of Ordnance, serving in the Air-craft Bomb Section from 1931-33. He went back to the fleet as assistant Fire Control Officer on the U.S.S. Memphis, CL, from 1933 to 1935; was Light Cruiser Gunnery Officer in the staff of Commander, Cruisers, Battle Forc, In 1936-38 he once more served

In 1936-38 he once more served in the Bureau of Ordnance, in the Turret Mount Section. In 1938-40 Captain Snackenberg was Gunnery Officer on the U.S.S. Idaho, joined the staff of Commander, Battle Force, as Assistant Operations Officer from 1930-11 ant Oper 1940-41.

In 1941-44 Captain Snackenberg joined the Ammunition Research Section of the Bureau of Ordnance taking part in the development of the rocket during that period.
In 1944 he again joined the fleet as Captain of the U.S.S.

George Clymorer, APA, taking part

in the Leyte Operation.
In January of this year he was ordered to take command of the U.S.S. Los Angeles.
